

(Continued from page 3) we've built," Ms. Fitzgerald said. "This organization is our lives. There's no holidays or weekends for us. We talk about what we're working on all the time, and as soon as we're done with it we're onto the next thing."

The next stop on the SCOPE tour was Nesaquake Middle School for Ms. Van Dover, who was given the district's Teacher Service Award. Ms. Van Dover has worked within the Smithtown Central School District for the past 51 years. She has served as an instructional specialist within the social studies department and is well-respected by her peers, according to Mr. Stewart.

The ceremony then shifted to St. James Elementary, where Ms. Groneman was given the Support Staff Service Award. Ms. Groneman has served as senior clerk typist at St. Jame Elementary since 1997 and is considered the "face of the school," according to Mr. Stewart. She is considered a superhuman multitasker by her peers and regularly extends her workdays. During vacations, she voluntarily visits the school to care for its chickens.
