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Run for a worthy cause

Foundation's "Smiles for Stefani" 5K set Sunday, April 7

he Smithtown Children's Foundation is sponsoring a "Smiles for Stefani" 5k Run/Walk Sunday, April 7 beginning at the Nesconset Gazebo at Nesconset Plaza. The event, which will include relay races, music, refreshments, as well as an awards ceremony, is m honor of Stefani Felber, a five-year-old little girl who was diagnosed with cancer at the young age of 10 months and has been battling for her life ever since with the support and love of her family and community.

Stefani Felber was born on April 1, 2008. She was the third child whose parents, Shannon and Hans Felber, welcomed to their family with love and pride. With an older sister, Arianna and brother, Benjamin, Stefani "was the last piece of the puzzle" in the Felber family, according to Ms. Felber. "She was the picture of perfection. She brought complete and utter joy to all of us with her angelic features and calming demeanor. I was in love from the moment she was placed in my arms," Ms. Felber said.

But less than one year later - February 5, 2009 - a gut instinct about their baby's deteriorating health found Mr. and Mrs. Felber at Schneider's Children's Hospital. "Around 10:30 p.m., we were told every parent's worst nightmare," said Ms. Felber. "Stefani had a brain tumor stretching from the 4th ventricle of her brain down through her brain stem." Doctors determined that the tumor, referred to as Diffuse Intrinsic Brain Stem Glioma/Upper Cervical Astrocytoma, was stage 2/3 Brain Cancer and was inoperable.

"The only way our baby would survive was through rounds of chemo," said Ms. Felber. The Felber family also treated Stefani with alternative medicine and therapies, such as acupuncture, chiropractic, organic-based foods, and natural remedies from Canada. In November of 2011, Stefani was declared "cancer-free" but the good news lasted only months, as the tumor returned in May of 2012.

As long as her tumor does not increase in size, Ms. Felber said that her daughter may avoid chemotherapy. She visits Memorial Sloan-Kettering in New York City every three months for a check-up and MRI of her brain. The family hopes that she will not have to endure more rounds of chemo and dreams of a day when their little girl will be cancerfree forever.

"Smiles for Stefani," established in 2009 by the Smithtown Children's Foundation, helps to raise

awareness for brain cancer and all pediatric cancers, as well as unite the community and bring to light the fact that other families also have children in need, according to Ms. Felber. "The Smithtown Children's Foundation is an amazing organization that has helped so many families like ourselves. Having the opportunity to share our story helps us to heal, keep the belief that Stefani will one day be cancer-free and hopefully gives other families like ours the hope we need to go through our daily lives."

The Smithtown Children's Foundation was formed by three members of the Smithtown community -Christine Fitgerald, Kristy Jaegar and Christina Alcure - all friends of the Kaylee Rivers family. Diagnosed in June, 2008 at age five, Kaylee Rivers sadly passed away in July, 2009, after battling stage 4 neuroblastoma, "forever changing the course of the lives of the Rivers family," according to Christine Fitzgerald, executive director of the Smithtown Children's Foundation. "It seems that we were fated to do this as when we introduced ourselves - we all had the same name - Christine, Christina and Kristy - and we later found ourselves finishing one another's sentences as if we'd known one another all of our lives," recalled Ms. Fitgerald. The three women - united in cause and passion - formed the Smithtown Children's Foundation, achieving their (Continued on page 44)

(Continued from page 1A) Smithtown Children's Foundation, achieving their 501c3 not-for-profit status in December 2009.

The mission of the Smithtown Children's Foundation is to provide financial and emotional support to children and families within the Smithtown community by bridging family, friends, neighbors and local businesses to act as one in times of crisis.

"The Smithtown Children's Foundation is 100 percent volunteer-based," said Ms. "We couldn't Fitzgerald. do what we do without these people!" In addition individual community members, volunteers include local school groups businesses including Smithtown Teacher's Association, DECA of marketing association students), Maureen's Kitchen, Bethpage Federal Credit Union, Merecedez-Benz of Smithtown, Towers Flowers in Nesconset, Swirls and Twirls Yogurt, and more. Through this combined effort. the Smithtown Children's Foundation can "assist the community on so many levels," said Ms. Fitzgerald, including being able to offer financial support to families through a number of special fundraising events.

Fundraising events enable the foundation to not only directly assist families in need but also to award several scholarships per year in memory of community members who have passed away. "We like to say that not only are we assisting local families in crisis and bringing the community together but fundraising through the efforts, which allows us to award the scholarships, we are memorializing loved ones and helping to heal hearts," said Ms. Fitgerald. Each spring, said Ms. Fitzgerald, Smithtown Children's Foundation meets with the families who represent the scholarships to choose the scholarship winners. "While we are sad that we are gathered for this as no one wants to be the family who is memorializing a loved one, at least the foundation can take pride in the knowledge that we are giving solace to these families and that we are helping them find something good to have come from their circumstance," she said.

Since its inception, the Smithtown Children's Foundation has expanded its efforts to assist individuals and families of all ages and circumstances in need, for example, community residents who have been forced from their home due

to financial difficulties or extraordinary events, such as a house fire. Ms. Fitgerald explained that the Smithtown Children's Foundation's application process includes a nomination form whereby anyone with a specific need can seek their support. "So for families either so busy getting through their crisis with not enough hours in the day, or others feeling too proud to ask for help, this was a great way for the foundation to reach out to them directly" Ms. Fitgerald said.

The Smithtown Children's Foundation is also dedicated to assuring that the students of the Smithtown community are geared with the resources they need to succeed and they work closely with their district's school social In addition to workers. helping to provide backpacks and school supplies to students without, the organization supplies social workers with over 60 thanksgiving baskets and certificates turkey each November, as well as 50 certificates to needy families in December... "just to spread a little cheer," said Ms. Fitzgerald.

The Smithtown Children's Foundation hosts three annual signature Friends Fore the Smithtown Community 6th Annual Golf Outing at The Hamlet Golf & Country Club, Holiday Breakfast/Boutique hosted by Maureen's Kitchen and Kisses for Kaylee Dinner/ Dance at The Watermill. The organization also hosts other "runs," such as Mike's Hike 4K Run, in memory of Michael Denaro, a teacher from Accompsett Elementary school who passed away suddenly over the spring break in 2011, leaving the school principal to explain to the teacher's second grade class why he would not be back. "In conjunction with the principal and some other teachers, we host this event in his memory as a way to give his students some positive memories of their beloved teacher," Ms. Fitzgerald explained. Part of the proceeds from that fundraiser go toward a science scholarship in the teacher's memory to graduating seniors at Smithtown High School East and West.

It is a goal of the Smithtown Children Foundation to continue to enhance its efforts and ability to support those in need, as well as to set a positive example for other communities. "We will continue to find new partners to affiliate ourselves with that will allow us to be a better community, one that others will want to emulate," said Ms. Fitgerald, adding that the

organization hopes to make other towns aware that with compassion and motivation, they too could assist families in need in their community in a similar way. "What a wonderful world if everyone had one another's backs?" she said.

Proceeds of the Smiles for Stefani 5k Run/Walk will benefit the Smithtown Children's Foundation so that they may continue to assist local families in need. Check-in for the event will be at 7:30 a.m. The race starts at 9 a.m. and the family walk begins at 9:15 a.m. Preregistration entrance fee,

which includes a tee shirt for the first 250 participants, is \$20 for a single runner/ walker or \$25 on the day of the race. First, second and third prizes will be awarded in age categories from ten years old and older.
